Shy Dogs; The Journey to Confidence

The medium sized red dog was wide-eyed and huddled in her crate, as if trying to make herself invisible. Her information sheet read "Merry," a name which in no way resembled the dog we were looking at. She had just come to Homeward Bound from a shelter; one of 14 dogs captured after they escaped from a dog hoarding situation. Our weekly volunteer email described her as TERRIFIED and told us to proceed slowly. VERY, VERY slowly.

My husband Doug and I, both volunteers at Homeward Bound, offered to foster Merry. We didn't know exactly what we were signing up for, but she needed a quieter place, and we were retired with no pets or kids at home, and no travel plans for the coming winter months.

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Our Mission

Homeward Bound Golden Retriever Rescue & Sanctuary, Inc. is an all-volunteer organization which rescues and heals displaced, abandoned, and homeless Golden Retrievers and Golden mixes, regardless of their age or health. Homeward Bound secures safe, loving homes through a comprehensive adoption program, and also provides lifetime sanctuary for Goldens that cannot be adopted.

Homeward Bound also provides education on proper animal care and on the benefits of, and need for, rescue and sanctuary. In the event of a disaster, Homeward Bound will provide assistance to other rescue groups and the families of dogs impacted by the disaster.

Homeward Bound will continue to serve as a model rescue organization, addressing animal welfare needs throughout California and neighboring states, and strives to be a national leader in rescue, sanctuary and education.

A Message from Our President

The news from the front lines of rescue is not good. Dogs are being surrendered and abandoned in record numbers; adopters and fosters are harder to find. Euthanasia lists are growing. The pandemic has worn on all of us. Sadly, all those pets sought for companionship in 2020-2021 are being given up as people return to work or lose their homes to financial hardship. Many of these are large breeds – adorable as puppies – but now untrained dogs unaccustomed to being left alone. They need good leaders and teachers capable of consistency and loving care.

Last year, we took in 100 more dogs than the prior year. We are on track to do the same or more in 2022. Our expenses grew with the number of dogs – many of them with long-neglected medical issues. While Goldens are always our priority, we have opened our doors to countless others – helping wherever we can. We were only able to do this thanks to the support of our volunteers, fosters, adopters, and generous supporters.

Every spring, a small group of big-hearted donors steps up to create a Fund of Love for the medical care of the dogs. Their gifts stand ready to match the smaller donations of many during the Double the Gold Challenge. Our Fund of Love donors have truly raised the bar with their generosity this year. We're asking anyone who can to dig deep to make a gift so we can capture every matching dollar.

Our unusual time includes moving forward without Homeward Bound's founders, with both Jody and Mike Jones now departed. However, they did not forget their passion and commitment to the dogs in their plans. 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Merry froze in place when scared, tail down and eyes wide. Food didn't motivate

her; tasty treats from scary people were also scary. Since a LOT of things scared her, (including picking her up) getting her from point A to Point B was often a challenge. At home we set up an X pen and a crate in the family room as Merry's "safe zone." She could come and go as she pleased to check things out, but that didn't happen often. She wasn't a dog you could pet or play with,

so we showed our love through patience, speaking softly, bringing meals to her safe zone, and taking her on short, leashed walks. She felt safe walking right between

> Doug and me, and would freeze in place if a neighbor stopped for a chat.

Along with giving Merry love & patience as she dealt with her fears, we also got to celebrate her victories. Many of us take our dog's wagging tail for granted; but the first time we saw Merry's tail wag we cheered! Finally taking a treat from my hand was another big day and having the

courage to come into the kitchen for her dinner was HUGE.

The folks at Homeward Bound fielded plenty of questions from us during this time with Merry. Along with inching into our kitchen, Merry was inching her way into our hearts, and we told Judy Kent we'd love to adopt her if the busier aspects of our lives weren't too scary for her. During one of our conversations Judy mentioned that she had taken her dog Jesse, also from a hoarding situation to the Shy Dog class at Homeward Bound. Who knew there was a class for shy dogs? We reached out to Kathryn Baines of Golden Rule Dog Training who proved to be an excellent resource. By this time Merry was trusting us more and deciding that tasty treats weren't so scary after all. Walks were also becoming more enjoyable; Merry would lead the way, tail held high. Kathryn came to our home to meet us and determined Merry would be a good fit for the shy dog group training class.

Kathryn says safe surroundings, lots of love and plenty of patience are key to helping shy fearful dogs learn to trust. Go slowly, don't force the dog to come to you. Avoid direct eye contact at first, as that can be considered a dominant behavior by humans. The same holds true for standing over them or patting them on the head. Step to the side, crouch down and pet under the chin, eventually working up to the ears and top of the head. She stresses that if cornered even a very shy fearful dog, could be aggressive. But at the other end of the spectrum, love and patience can build the trust that results in courage and confidence. Kathryn says

COMET

At nine months of age, Comet was surrendered with hip dysplasia. The family could not support the needed surgery to restore the full use of his hip or relieve his pain. They also recognized that, even with surgery, Comet may have long-term needs related to the dysplasia as he ages. In March, Comet underwent FHO surgery in which the head of the femur



is removed and the muscles around the femur and hip socket gradually strengthen through time and therapy to create a false joint. The process takes a minimum of eight weeks for recovery which is hardest on very young dogs who just want to run and play.



ADIRA



Adira was found stray in the Central Valley. You wouldn't know it by her photo, but she is a Golden mix between 6-8 years old. This weak and delicate mom of likely numerous litters arrived in late January. She was underweight with a serious skin condition requiring medications and special weekly baths, a heart murmur and arrhythmia, an poorly healed leg break, and

an overwhelming look of sadness. Two months at foster cured the sadness and nearly restored a full coat of healthy hair. Today, she is a foster failure - adopted by her foster family. Someone discarded Adira like trash; we discovered a gem with good care and love.



LILLY

Lilly was also found stray in the Central Valley, weighing in at only 23 lbs. That she was still standing was a miracle in itself. She is approximately 10 years old, blind, and diabetic. She has earned the coveted office dog spot where she has found a quiet place and we can keep a close watch on her, administer insulin twice daily, and feed her small meals multiple times during the day to try to slowly help her gain much-needed weight. Since her arrival, she has gained six pounds with a long way to go. That this kind of neglect happens so close to home is so disheartening. But she is safe now and we will guide her recovery while administering the most important medicine: love.

EVE

Eve arrived with a male friend. They had been found stray together, a likely dumped breeding pair. At only five years of age, she had clearly birthed multiple litters. Our vet discovered a chain of mammary tumors; exposure to specific hormones increases the risk. Eve was scheduled for a double mastectomy - the first taking place in late 2021 and the second in early 2022. Eve shared her displeasure with the cones and crating required for her recovery, but she is now

healed and living the spoiled life she deserves!



At only three months of age, Boomer was found stray with a broken leg. How this little one was abandoned this way, we'll never know. The break was too old for us to heal surgically, so it was splinted with a prescription for eight weeks of rest and weekly bandage changes. Determined to make a mockery of both instructions even under the watchful eyes of his fosters, Boomer repeatedly removed his splint! His leg may have a lifelong limp, but it will be fully usable thanks to the care he received - and his spirit clearly remains unbroken!



In 2021, our veterinary expenses exceeded \$355,000-a 33% increase over 2021 in keeping with the higher intake and the dogs' extraordinary needs. We took in 420 dogs. Another 85 were supported in permanent foster with their

medical needs met by Homeward Bound - so they could be home.

Most of the dogs that came to us required basic or minor veterinary care. Some needed much, much more.

We know that these are extraordinary times and that many of you are under pressure as well. Anything you can contribute during the Double the Gold Challenge will not only help - it will go twice as far as your gift is doubled by the waiting Fund of Love match created by a few big-hearted donors.

Pet Cancer Awareness

Cancer remains a leading cause of illness and death in dogs of many breeds. According to the Centers for Disease Control, approximately 6 million dogs are diagnosed with cancer each year. It's a heart-stopping diagnosis for any dog mom or dad. The good news is that new treatment strategies to fight human cancer are making their way into veterinary medicine, giving hope to the many dogs diagnosed with cancer each year.

Chemotherapy has been used to treat cancer for more than 70 years, and radiation has been used as a cancer therapy for over a century. However, it wasn't until the last part of the 20th century that cancer treatments made significant advances, becoming more refined and targeted. Cancer treatments continue to evolve with multiple studies looking at innovative ways to treat cancer in dogs.

SIGNS OF CANCER

The most obvious sign of most cancers is an external lump that continues to enlarge. This lump may ulcerate, bleed, or cause other physical effects like pressure and displacement of the surrounding tissues. Internal cancers can be more difficult to spot as cancer can develop in any cell in the body.

Weight loss due to loss of body fat and muscle is common with malignant cancers. Unexplained, chronic weight loss can be an important sign of cancer. Other signs of cancer can be abnormal bleeding, unexplained vomiting or diarrhea, swollen lymph nodes, coughing, and lameness. Bad breath or a change in eating patterns can be a sign of oral (mouth) cancers.

TREATMENT OPTIONS

The most common and often most effective treatment is surgical removal of the



tumor. Other treatments may be considered for tumors that are too big or too numerous to be removed, are in inaccessible locations, and for non-tumor types of cancer such as leukemia. These include drugs (chemotherapy), immunotherapy (specific or nonspecific stimulation of the immune system), and radiation therapy. These treatments are typically performed at specialty centers. New approaches, such as cancer vaccines, are under research and development.

Chemotherapy, radiation, and immunotherapy are not suitable for all types of cancer and may have significant side effects. There are many issues to be considered in the decisions on cancer treatment including your pet's age, overall health, and quality of life. These should be discussed with your veterinarian or veterinary oncologist and your wishes for your pet should be foremost in care decisions.

RESEARCH HOPE

The word 'cancer' is not synonymous with a terminal diagnosis. New treatments and studies are constantly being explored. Because cancer is so prevalent in Golden Retrievers, the Morris Animal Foundation, has been conducting a Golden Retriever Lifetime study to identify risk factors for cancer development, which will help veterinary medicine move forward faster with new strategies for prevention and

treatment. The Golden Retriever Lifetime Study is one of the largest, most comprehensive prospective canine health studies in the United States with health, environmental and behavioral data collected on 3.000+ enrolled Golden Retrievers.

Although cancer remains a major cause of illness and death in dogs, recent treatment advances give owners new hope that our four-legged family members with cancer will have longer and healthier lives. The best, most proactive things you can do for your canine companion are feeding your dog a healthy diet, providing good medical care with routine checkups, and staying alert to changes in your dog's physical condition.



When Forever is Not

We use the phrase forever home a lot. That's our ideal for all dogs. A home they have for life. But it's not always the reality for many reasons. Circumstances change. Re-homing a pet is sometimes the best choice, even for a much-loved dog if done for the right reasons. Bad fits with other human or animal family members, changes in health or family, loss of home or livelihood, or simply realizing that someone got in over their head does not make them a bad human. Sometimes, it means they made a mistake. Other times. it is the hardest - and kindest - decision they could make.


Dogs remember, but they generally adapt. If treated well in their previous home, they can move on without baggage and begin a new life. If not treated well, they are absolutely better off finding a family that will restore their emotional and physical health.

We don't reject potential adopters for having re-homed a dog in the past. We ask 'why?' to understand the circumstances. Recently, an adorable and gigantic puppy named Hank (the Tank) came to us. He was only three months, but it was clear that this rapidly growing boy was overwhelming the small dog and cat in the household. The family had done everything right. Careful introductions, excellent training, and good medical care. But



Hank was of very large size for his breed, destined to be a 90-100-pound dog. He loves other dogs, but the family quickly realized that his exuberance was never going to be a match for the other small animals in the household. They did the right thing – for Hank and their current pets. They sought out a reputable rescue, asked lots of questions, and provided copious notes about his care and needs. Then they tearfully surrendered him so Homeward Bound could find Hank a more appropriate home. That does not make this family bad pet parents in our book. It makes them a five-star family when their pet situation changes, and they are ready to adopt someday.

There will always be people who surrender for the wrong reason – or simply abandon. That's a different story. To keep loving families and pets together through temporary hurdles, support can be offered through donated food, a low-cost vaccination or spay/neuter clinic - or even affordable dog training classes. But when the need is greater, please don't judge people for rehoming a pet responsibly. Sometimes, forever is not forever and the most important thing is to do the right thing, today.

For the time being, it is business as usual – with our heartfelt gratitude to Jody and Mike Jones for their vision and generosity.

their wills or trusts enabled us to begin a reserve that has grown with the market and has put us in a position to plan to exercise this option – much sooner than we imagined.


From Rescued to Loved

Remington was featured two years ago in our spring campaign. He is the gorgeous big boy who was hit by a car and left with a broken and degloved leg - meaning that only a small strip of skin was left in place. It was a devasting injury and he was too big a boy for amputation to be a solution. Jody Jones took Remington when no other rescue would step up and oversaw his twice daily bandage changes and application of a special, expensive honey salve that promotes skin growth. Mitch, one of our volunteers, was steadfast by his side. When Remington was ready, he took him home to foster and fell head over heels in love.



Today, Remington's leg is completely healed except for one tiny bald patch that marks his journey. Mitch is still by his side – now, officially as 'dad.' He shares this note to his Homeward Bound family proving that rescue changes human lives as much as the dogs.'

It's hard to believe but this week marks two years since I was fortunate enough to officially adopt Remington. He's just so wonderful and I am so thankful every day to have him as my co-pilot. It's never lost on me just how winding the paths were that we took to eventually team up but also how it would have never happened without the amazing efforts from all of you.



I am coming into my third year of volunteering at Homeward Bound and I can truly say that my experience here has been the best. Yes, the Tuesday AM team still - on occasion (ok, maybe regularly) – has to listen to a rant from me when I read a story that I find bothersome about a beautiful dog sitting in a kennel. And yes, I still get choked up on a very regular basis by these same beautiful dogs who can't quite understand what they did wrong. The class attendees held their breath as the shy red dog very tentatively walked into the area. Smiles broke out all around as she stood still and let the dogs come over and sniff. It was fascinating to see even the largest and the most energetic dogs gently approaching the newest member. Kathryn says it's like they're saying "Hi. I have issues. Do you have issues, too?"

For the next hour, going at her own pace, Merry walked and sniffed with the other dogs and took a few treats from their owners. She'd also circle back to Doug and me for some petting and praise, as if taking a victory lap so we could all celebrate her latest step of confidence and courage.
